

To Register you need 2 pieces of identification

Examples:

Illinois State Driver's License

Illinois State
ID card

Medicaid Card

Who's Eligible To Register & Vote?

To vote in an election, you must be registered to vote

To register to vote you must:

- Be a United States citizen
- Be at least 18 years old by Election Day, or 17 years old to vote in a Primary, if you will be 18 as of the following General Election
- Have lived in your election precinct at least 30 days before Election Day.



Even if you have a guardian, you have a right to vote!

Ways to register:

In person

By mail

Online

There are lots of places you can register

How and Where Can I Register to Vote?

In person at your local:

- Election Authority Office
- City, Village and Township Offices
- Schools
- Public Libraries
- Driver's license facility

when you apply for services including renewing your license

What Other Ways Can I Register to Vote?

By mail

- 1. Fill out a voter registration form
- 2. Mail it to your local election authority

- download it from the Illinois State Board of Elections' website: www.elections.il.gov



- have a valid email address
- provide a valid driver's license number or state ID card number.



How Do We Vote?

- Before Election Day by going to an early voting location
- On Election Day by going to your polling place
- By using a vote by mail ballot no reason or excuse needed

You may request an application for a vote by mail ballot by mail, in person, or online from your local election authority





REMINDER

If it's Election Day and you haven't registered to vote yet, go to your local election authority to register and vote right there


